

Each learner contributed R100 to take part in a range of exciting activities. Stations were set up across the school, each costing R5 per turn.


# Highlights included:







Integrating Makaton into classrooms and therapy sessions proves highly beneficial, as its signs closely correspond with spoken words and actions, fostering clearer and more meaningful communication.

On 21 June 2025, a Makaton Level 1 training was conducted to educators, therapists, parents, and carers seeking to develop more effective communication skills.











# MEDICATION MANAGEMENT FOR AUTISM

On April 12th, 2025, Via Nova School parents welcomed Dr. Johan Erasmus, a developmental pediatrician specializing in medication management for Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorders (ADHD). Dr. Erasmus thoroughly explained that managing these diagnoses requires a comprehensive approach. While medication can be a valuable tool in alleviating symptoms, it is crucial to understand its specific role within the broader scope of treatment.

#### Understanding ASD and ADHD:

ASD: A neurodevelopmental disorder affecting social interaction, communication, and behavior. ADHD: A neurodevelopmental disorder characterized by inattention, hyperactivity, and impulsiveness.

## Medication Management:

- Individualized treatment: Medication plans are customized to meet the unique needs of each patient.
- Symptom management: Medications are used to address specific symptoms, such as hyperactivity or anxiety.
- Monitoring and adjustments: Regular evaluations are conducted to ensure the effectiveness of the medication while minimizing side effects.

#### Medications Commonly Prescribed:

ASD: Medications such as Risperdal or Ability are often used to manage symptoms like irritability, aggression, or anxiety.

ADHD: Stimulants like Ritalin and Adderall, or non-stimulants like Strattera, are effective in improving attention and impulse control.

### Considerations:


- Dosage and titration: Careful adjustments should be made to achieve optimal benefits.
- Side effects: Monitoring for potential side effects, such as weight gain or sleep disturbances, is essential.
- Comorbidities: Managing co-occurring conditions, such as anxiety or depression, is crucial for comprehensive care.

Multidisciplinary teams: Collaboration with therapists, educators, and families.


Family support: Educating families on medication management and treatment plans.
















# **WELCOME TO OUR NEW TEAM MEMBERS!**

# TRAINING - EARLY IDENTIFICATION OF BARRIERS TO LEARNING & CURRICULUM DIFFIRENTIATION Written by Happy Masondo

On 17 May 2025, Via Nova School hosted a professional development training on "Barriers to Learning and Differentiated Teaching". The session equipped educators with essential strategies to support the diverse needs of all learners. The training brought together teachers and therapists from both mainstream and special needs schools. Key topics included:

# 1. Types of Barriers to Learning:

- Extrinsic: poverty, trauma, abuse, lack of transport or nutrition
- Systemic: language of learning and teaching (LoLT), overcrowded classes, limited teacher training

## 2. Teacher's Role in SIAS:

• Early identification, classroom-based support, and documentation using Individual Support Plans (ISP)

#### 3. Emotional and Behavioral Difficulties:

• Techniques to manage challenging behaviors and create a positive classroom climate.

# 4. Differentiated Teaching:

A major focus was Differentiated Teaching, which tailors' instruction to each learner's strengths and needs. As Ms. Annerie Krause explained, "Every child learns differently, and it's our responsibility to adapt our teaching so every learner can succeed." Through interactive engagements and practical demonstrations, educators learned the following regarding differentiated teaching and learning:

- Goals of differentiated instruction, key elements of differentiated process and key aspects.
- Assessing individual learners' strength and areas for growth.
- Varying methods, materials, and using tools like task boxes effectively

Via Nova School remains committed to continuous professional development and ensuring all learners receive the highest quality education. This training reaffirmed the school's dedication to equity and accessibility in every classroom.
